FROM THE COLLEGE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

CATHOLIC EDUCATION DIOCESE of PARRAMATTA 2018 Pilgrimage to the Holy Land, Rome and Assisi Itinerary

JORDAN, AMMAN

Mt Nebo, where Moses looked over into the Promised Land and blessed Joshua who led the Israelites under God's protection (Joshua 1:6-9).

DEAD SEA TO THE SEA OF GALILEE, GALILEE then to the Dead Sea to float in the salty waters that are said to have healing qualities. Bethany Beyond the Jordan, the five springs here form the tributary of the Jordan River, believed to be the Baptismal site of Jesus. Then we will cross the border into the Holy Land of Israel, to journey onto Tiberias on the shores of Lake Galilee... "Go to Galilee and you will find him there" (Mt 28:7). Walk to the summit of Mt Tabor, where Our Lord's divinity shone forth in the Transfiguration (Mt 17:1-2). Then to Capernaum, the centre of Jesus' teaching and healing and the home of Peter the Apostle (Mt 4:12-20) before visiting Magdala, the town of Mary Magdalene. Visit the Nof Ginosar Kibbutz, where there are preserved remains of first century fishing boats as in the days of Christ.

We will then experience a private Mass floating in the centre of Lake Galilee and recall the miracles of Jesus calming the storm, appearing to the apostles and walking on the water. Followed by a special 'St Peter's fish lunch. A visit to Tabgha, the site of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes (Mt 14:20).

Travelling out from Galilee, we visit Haifa-Mt Carmel where Elijah spoke of false prophets, and Elijah's cave where he lived and meditated before defeating pagan prophets of Baal and where he hid fleeing the wrath of King Ahab. We will also visit the Carmelite Monastery and the Chapel of the Holy Family and the House of Grace.

Later in the Nazareth township, we will enter the Basilica of the Annunciation where Mary's response was "Let it be done to me according to thy Word" (Luke 1:38). Then to Cana, where Jesus, requested by His Mother, performed his first miracle transforming water into wine at the wedding feast (Jn 2:1-11).

We begin the next day with Mass at the Mount of Beatitudes and reflect of Jesus' message of happiness – Sermon on the Mount (Mt 5:1-12). Leaving Galilee, we go through Samaria, a land rich in Old Testament history. We will see the twin peaks of Mt Gerizim and Mt Ebal, known in the Old Testament as Mt Blessing and Mt Cursing.

We visit Jacob's Well (over 100 feet = 30.48m in depth) where the water at the bottom is fed by flowing water which is why ancients gave it the name of 'living water.' At this well, Jesus met the Samaritan women and said to her: "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (Jn 4:13-14). Then we journey to Jerusalem.

JERUSALEM

Here we travel out to Bethlehem, the City of David. In the Shepherd's Field we commemorate the appearance of angels to the shepherds on that first Christmas night (Lk 2:8-16), with Mass.

We visit the Church of Nativity built over the stable where Jesus was born and descend into the Grotto of the Holy Manger. A silver star in the floor marks the spot where Christ was born.

Then to Bethlehem University and Ein Karem, the birthplace of St John the Baptist and the site of the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth "Why should I be honoured with a visit from the Mother of my Lord" (Lk 1:43). At this Church, dedicated to 'The Magnificat' we reflect on the joyful mysteries of the Rosary. We meet the Bereaved Parents, who have endured so much and are trying so hard to bring peace to the Holy Land.

On the next day, on the Mt of Olives we visit the Church of 'Pater Noster' commemorating the site where Jesus taught His disciples the Lord's Prayer (Mt 6:7-15). We walk down the Palm Sunday Road, passing the tombs of the Prophets Haggai, Malachi and Zechariah before arriving at Dominus Fleuit for Mass. This church was built on the site where Jesus wept over the city of Jerusalem (Lk 19:41-44).

In the Garden of Gethsemane, we enter the Church of Agony containing bare rock upon where Jesus is said to have prayed before his arrest. This garden contains olive trees. We see the path Jesus was taken upon as a prisoner while ascending Mt Zion to the house of the High Priest Caiaphas and reflect later in the private garden- Garden Virgin Mary.

We visit the Israel Museum to view a Second Temple scale model of Jerusalem as it was in the time of Jesus, as well as visiting the Shrine of the Book to view the Dead Sea Scrolls. At the Church of St Peter in Gallicantu, we recall that it was here that Jesus was interrogated and imprisoned, while Peter denied Jesus three times. Later to visit the Cenacle room of the Last Supper and the Church of Dormition where Our Lady was assumed into heaven.

We begin our next day with Stations of the Cross, at Antonia Fortress where Jesus was condemned to death. We pray and follow in Our Lord's footsteps, visiting the Flagellation and Condemnation Chapels along the actual Via Dolorosa to the site of Calvary to celebrate Mass in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. We will see through glass panels the rocks where the Cross of Jesus once stood and enter the Edicule containing the tomb where Our Lord rose from the dead.

Continuing on to visit a church built over the birthplace of the Virgin Mary, Church of St Anne and the Pool of Bethesda where Jesus healed the paralysed man (Jn 5:2-9). Onto the Jewish section of the Old City for a view of the Dome of the Rock, El Aqsa Mosque and the Western Wall.

We travel Jericho Road as we remember the Good Samaritan and journey through desert hills to pass the site of Qumran where the Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered in 1947 by a Bedouin shepherd boy. Continuing south along the Dead Sea to Masada, we go on a cable car to view the scenery at the summit and have a guided tour of Herod's fortress and the Zealot's last stand. In Jericho later, we celebrate Mass at the Good Shepherd Church and across the valley we see Mt Temptation, the site of Jesus' fast of 40 days. This is our final day in the Holy Lands before flying to Rome.

ROME

After a private Mass in St Peter's Basilica at the Altar of the Tomb of St Peter, we go to experience a guided tour of the Vatican Museums to see the Sistene Chapel (view Michelangelo's masterpieces, including the fresco of the Last Judgement) and the Crypt and tombs of past Popes.

The next day we go to St Peter's Square where the Holy Father is expected to host a general audience with pilgrims. Later we enter the Colosseum where early Christians were martyred and in 1749, Pope Benedict XIV declared a sacred site.

We visit ancient excavations and catacombs of the early Christian Church under St Peter's Basilica – the Necropoli and also visit the site of the original tomb of St Peter.

A coach will take us to the Basilica of St John in Lateran (First Papal residence) and the Holy Stairs.

ASSISI

This is where St Francis tended the poor and sick and founded the Franciscan Order. We celebrate Mass in the Basilica of St Mary of the Angels on the plain where St Francis spent most of his life. We go to the Upper Town where we visit the Basilica of St Clare where we kneel before the famous crucifix from which Jesus spoke to St Francis.

We visit the Basilica of St Francis housing the tomb of St Francis and the Church of St Damiano built on the site where St Francis heard the voice of Christ speaking through the crucifix 'go rebuild my Church, which you see is falling down.' This will be my final day on pilgrimage.

I will then leave the CEDP Pilgrim group and travel through Italy, France and Singapore to see you all again in Week 3.

God Bless and you will be in my prayers and heart as I take all of who have journeyed with me in my life to the Holy Lands.

Why is Uniform Important?

Uniform by definition means “the same”. The idea behind a uniform is that students do not need to worry about what they have to wear to school because it is stock standard. It allows for consistency and it promotes a sense of community if all can wear it well. Some students at schools feel a sense of entitlement in that the uniform rules should not apply to them. They feel that they should have the right to opt out of the uniform expectations and do what they want. In these cases, good schools challenge the students about what and why they are choosing to opt out of the community expectations. They may lose learning time and will generally have to give time in the form of recess or lunchtime detentions.

If on the other hand, students choose to follow the expectations of the uniform, they show they are ready for learning as they do not want to argue the point with the school. Our uniform is very well presented. When students go on excursions where they see students from other schools, staff always get comments from McCarthy students that they feel proud of how they look. Now we know that the clothes don't make the person BUT we would like to teach our students how to feel comfortable in more formal clothing whether they go into work that requires that or not. I cannot tell you how many students I see around the school and say to them how sharp they are looking. A young man in a tie with a blazer, wearing his belt and his shirt comfortably tucked in or a young lady with her skirt to the knee and the rest of her uniform worn correctly reflects well on the students and the College. They actually give the sign that they are ready to learn. They agree with what the school stands for and they would like to follow where they are directed in their classes. Your support with our uniform is greatly appreciated and we look forward to having fewer students on detention and ready to learn.

I hope all students had an enjoyable holiday period. Once again the year is flying through and we look forward to an enjoyable final term of school for 2018.


Bishop's Social Justice Writing Competition

Lucrecia Carter (Year 9) was awarded 2nd place in the Bishop's Social Justice Writing Competition. Lucrecia answered the question:



"In a Catholic context discuss the ways the most vulnerable are able to find a place as individuals in society".

English Update

In the blink of an eye, Term 3 is over and what a term it was. The term has seen some wonderful learning happening throughout the entire College in English classes.

In Stage 4, our **Year 7** students have sunk their teeth into a novel study where they have produced some fantastic book reviews and are currently working towards writing and recording monologue. Most of Year 7 have been reading one of the books in the Once series by Morris Glietzmann and it has been great to see that students have not wanted to stop reading, with many students choosing to read extra novels in the series. Meanwhile, **Year 8** have also been reading novels and completing a portfolio of work and are now working towards a recorded book club type conversation to talk about the exciting things in their novel.

In Stage 5, **Year 9** have had the opportunity to choose from 6 different novels to study and the feedback around these has been great. They have been creating TEE (technique, example, explanation) charts to help them prepare for extended analytical responses. **Year 10** students have been refining their visual literacy and have delved into the wonderful world of picture books. They have looked at four very different texts throughout the term and it has been pleasing to see them activating their previous knowledge. They have been creating reviews of these books and also working towards an extended response to help them prepare for the rigour of senior high school.

Stage 6 students have been in full swing at the moment. **Year 11** Advanced and Standard English have been preparing for their preliminary examination on the poetry of WB Yeats and Wilfred Owen respectively. The Standard cohort have had the opportunity to mix the classes together and work in different groups to help teach other students about poetry and have produced some outstanding work. And finally, our **Year 12** students have been working hard to make the most of the revision period that has been available to them since the trial exams. Students are setting individual and group goals, identifying areas of strength and weakness and recrafting their writing to ensure that their HSC examination is their absolute best work. We want to take this opportunity to thank the Year 12 cohort for all their hard work and dedication, it has been fabulous to see you all mature into fine young ladies and gentlemen, we wish you all the best for your upcoming exams and we cannot wait to hear about your success come December.



Last term **Year 9 Food Technology** students were learning about food service and catering. They have looked at the rights and responsibilities of consumers and companies, employment areas, types of menus (a la carte, cyclic and d'hote), table settings, menu planning and recipe development. Our assessment has been to design a menu for a particular function, setting the table and cooking one item off the menu and presenting it as if we would at that function.



On Friday of Week 6, Year 7 participated in their final activity towards the completion of their STEM Bridge Building project. With each group having only 60 paddle pop sticks, 5 metres of string and a hot glue gun to construct their final bridge design. Members of each group came to the centre of the room where the bridges were placed between tables with a bucket underneath and a timber weight attached to the centre of the bridge. The students then poured water into the bucket until it broke, with the last bridge of each class standing going into the grand final. Each group's bucket of water was weighted also with the final bridge holding 13Kg of water.

"We worked as a team and made a design that we thought would be the most appealing and hold the most weight. We created a truss bridge and it ended up holding 12kg of water and we were happy as we tied second place across the year group. It was a great experience and we worked well as a team, in constructing, designing, listening and comprising".

- address
- date of birth
- email address
- username and password
- bank account details



Disclosing personal information online

Many online services require users to provide some personal information in order to use their service. Prior to providing personal information, you should think about what can be done with your personal information and assess whether you are still happy to pass on these details. In addition to inappropriate or illegal use of information, disclosing personal information online can impact your digital reputation.

There are several online activities that you should be aware of that may require a level of disclosure of personal information. These include:

- **Shopping:** to verify the identity of the purchaser, to process payments or for the delivery of goods.
- **Subscribing or registering:** a screen name or ID and an email address are often minimum requirements but other requested information may include: age, gender, address, photo and personal likes or dislikes (a red asterisk (*) generally identifies mandatory fields that are needed to register).
- **Online games and virtual worlds:** these may require users to register before they can begin to play.

What might happen if I share my personal information online?

Spam, scams, identity theft and fraud are just some of the more serious issues that you might face if you are sharing personal information online.

How can I protect my personal information

It's important to understand how personal information is used online and how to protect your information and digital reputation.

The following tips are a great basis for protecting your personal information online:


- Only disclose financial information on secure websites. Look for an address beginning with <https://> and a 'locked' padlock symbol in the bottom of the screen, which indicates that data is being encrypted.

- If in doubt about the legitimacy of a website, call the organisation it claims to represent. The [SCAMwatch](#) website provides further advice on how to identify and report potential scams.

- Read user agreements and privacy policies. Many organisations use information for marketing purposes and may sell it to other marketing firms. If information is posted on websites that do sell information to marketers, individuals may receive promotional spam emails which can be difficult to stop.



- Reduce spam by protecting your details. Spam can be reduced by:
 - * limiting disclosure of email addresses and mobile numbers
 - * installing and using spam filtering software
 - * checking the terms and conditions when purchasing products, entering competitions or registering for services or email newsletters
 - * not allowing contact details to be used for marketing purposes (making sure you check the opt out box)
 - * boosting online security to limit spam



- Understand that information shared online can be permanent—users may not have control over who sees or accesses their personal information. This includes teachers, parents and prospective employers.
- Select passwords carefully. When creating passwords there are some definite dos and don'ts, these include:



- use eight characters or more
- use a combination of words that aren't predictable
- use two-factor authentication on accounts containing personal information




- use pet names, birthdates, family or friends' names
- use a predictable combination of words (eg. 'ilovehiking'), a context specific word (eg. 'google') or repeated sequential characters (eg. 'aaaaa' or '123456')
- share passwords with others, even with friends
- store them on your device, unless it's via a password manager which stores them in an encrypted database.

YEAR 7 REPORT

As part of the Year 7 Pastoral Program the students have been looking at friendships - positive friendships and the way we talk to each other within a friendship group. They completed a paper scrunching activity to demonstrate once words are said they can't be taken back and even if you didn't mean them they still play a role in affecting the person.
