

Dear Parents and friends of the McCarthy community

As the year draws to a close, it is very important to reflect on the wonderful year we have had at our college. The announcement of our new college name from 2020 to Penola Catholic College has been received with much excitement for our future. This name reflects the work we have been immersed in as a community exploring St Mary Mackillop as she is Australia's first saint canonized in 2010. Her first school built with Fr Julian Tenison Woods was built in Penola South Australia bringing education to everyone in the community, including indigenous children of this rural community. Her strong passion for teaching and learning was evident in all that she did to ensure that it was accessible to everyone regardless of culture, ethnicity and age. As the founder of the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart she set up the first convent in Penrith where the sisters taught at St Nicholas of Myra primary. Another convent followed at St Mary's where the sisters started Our Lady of the Rosary Primary. It is wonderful that we can continue building on this Catholic identity and tradition that was commenced by St Mary Mackillop of the Cross in 1880 in our local area.



Our recent Staff Development Day was spent travelling to the St Mary Mackillop Museum and Chapel for our immersion of faith as a staff group. This was a truly amazing day for us as we have sent the last 3 years learning about her charism and looking at ways that her values can form an integral part of the learning and faith dimensions of our school life. The key values that we have drawn upon that will form the focus of Penola Catholic College will be; Courage, Compassion, Integrity and Hope. We will look for creative ways to ensure that these values are embedded in all aspects of school life at our new college Penola by working with students, staff and parents. LEARN2020 @ PENOLA CATHOLIC COLLEGE

During my time at the college over the last 4 years, we have worked on developing a strong, positive culture of learning that allows our students to be engaged in learning, develop a sense of empowerment in their learning and develop enterprise skills that will give them a distinct edge in comparison to other students competing for placement in University or employment possibilities. Our students are expected to be able to work independently, as well as in teams and collaborate to complete tasks or find solutions. Our students work on developing management and organisational skills across ALL subjects and courses of study Year 7-12. As well as this we are now embedding the following global competencies to assist in building the capability of our students for jobs of the future:

- ⇒ Character
- ⇒ Citizenship
- ⇒ Collaboration
- ⇒ Communication
- ⇒ Creativity
- ⇒ Critical thinking.

We have worked on developing a Learning Framework at our college that focuses on:

- ⇒ Stage 4: Engagement in Learning
- ⇒ Stage 5: Empowerment In Learning
- ⇒ Stage 6: Enterprise Skills in Learning

Our next steps in 2020 will be to go deeper in our learning with students. As a result, we will work in 100 minute learning sessions with students to be able to work in a contemporary way modelling expectations unlike work settings where skills in collaboration in teams, communication and critical thinking are called upon readily.

The PLUSES for student learning are:

- ⇒ Allows teachers to focus student learning through a series of smaller tasks that incremently build their understanding and skills
- ⇒ Teachers to design learning in sequential levels of difficulty and students to access at points of need with greater
- ⇒ opportunities for students to self pace
- ⇒ See students less often but for a more substantive time frame for learning consolidation. Opportunities for students to explore and inquire deeper during the sustained learning sessions
- ⇒ Students have fewer books and learning resources to carry around in their bags each day to school
- ⇒ Less movement time and lost time between periods/classes
- ⇒ Greater responsibility on students to have completed their work in preparation for the next learning sessions and bring learning resources

This change in daily structure may time a few weeks to become accustomed to the 'new' longer learning sessions, however it will lead to greater potential for deeper learning and success in student achievements in learning.

I would like to thank all parents for your ongoing support as we continuously look for creative and innovative ways to transform and strengthen learning for your child at our fine college.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND MISSION

A crisis always gives rise to a dream.

John the Baptist's main message is not to oppress others especially if you are in power and therefore calls us to be a witness of courage and hope in a culture of indifference. We have some work to do in Australia.

Aren't we all distracted by the "stuff" of our material world? We are full of stuff and when we are full there is no room for God. My grandparents built their house on a river, they loved fishing, they were sustainable, their house was small and simple. They didn't have to travel far for water, food or friends. A very happy existence. Then our world started to change and they made me very aware and shared this story.

A new neighbour came into the neighbourhood. They didn't want to build down near the river, they wanted to build upon the mountain, really a big hill compared to our beautiful blue mountains. So they cleared the trees, levelled the ground and proceeded to put in pipes to the river and other technologies. My grandfather specifically said that "they imposed themselves and their will on the earth."

The culture of convenience is a part of all our lives, let's manage it well. This change of thinking from living with the earth to imposing our selves onto it is the real battle in our Church. God reveals himself to us through the person of Jesus (Christmas), Word of God (the stories of a people and their relationship with God) and Church (a place in our society who has faced a great scandal, but faced it with courage calling for mercy and truth). It is the Advent of Jesus that will bring us back to the small house next to the river rather than the house on the hill. The house on the hill calls us into the secular world, imposing our will, when our neighbour wants to reform faith into something "we" want rather than listening to what the spirit is saying and being part of the creative spirit. I wonder what Jesus' answer for us would be when we ask "What do I have to do to enter the Kingdom of Heaven?"

Mary MacKillop said, "As far back as I can remember, God gave me such a sense of His watchful presence", and by living with integrity, God has "taught me to lean upon Him alone". It is from this that she was empowered by Christ to respond to the needs of her neighbour with courage and compassion, the desire for God's glory, and with hope to reach the fullness of life (John 10:10).

Applications for 2020 HSC Disability Provisions Are Now Open

Disability provisions information for parents of students completing the HSC in 2020:

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) grants Disability Provisions to some students for the Higher School Certificate. Please read the following information carefully, it may relate to your child.

Who should apply for disability provisions?

Students with:

- · A hearing or vision impairment
- · A physical disability; a back problem; a writing-hand issue, etc.
- · A learning difficulty dyslexia or other problems with reading or writing
- · Difficulty with reading or slow handwriting due to a diagnosed disability
- · An intellectual disability
- · A medical condition diabetes, ADD/ADHD, serious headaches or other illness, etc.
- · Anxiety, depression or other mental illness diagnosed and supported by specialists

What are some of the provisions?

- · A reader and / or writer
- · Extra time allowance
- · Rest breaks
- · Separate supervision
- · Special seating within the exam space
- · Diabetic provisions.
- · Individual provisions for students with a hearing or vision impairment

How does my child apply?

- They go to the office of the Leader of Diversity and Innovation in the Mary courtyard and speak with Ms Keogh or Mrs Voutos. Otherwise, our School Counsellor Jess Austin can provide information in relation to provisions.
- There are specialist reports and student statement forms that need to be completed as part of the application process.

Applications are due into NESA by the end of Term 1 2020 but may be submitted from Term 4 2019. The earlier the application is completed, the sooner we know the outcome. Students who are granted HSC Disability Provisions have them for the whole of Year 12 (assessment tasks and all examinations).












LEADER OF PEDAGOGY AND INSTRUCTIONAL COACH

As we move forward into 2020 as Penola, we are looking forward to what 2020 will bring. We are always looking for ways to lift the learning and this will continue to happen as we transition to Penola. We want our students to understand that at times learning can feel uncomfortable, this is known as 'zone of confusion' but it is through dedication, persistence and determination that they will achieve. This sense of uneasiness is referred to as the learning pit.



It is through collaboration, surface, deep to transfer learning where students work their way out. NOTHING is considered a failure but EVERYTHING is considered a learning. However, your child / our student needs to be prepared to take on this challenge with a growth mindset.

As a parent do you know where your child is at on their learning journey? When met with a challenge do they: dig their heels in and simple say 'I won't do this'?

It is important we do this as a community. As a parent, how can you support / assist?

Talk to your child about:

What they are finding difficult at school and how have they gone about trying to figure it out. What do they find easy, when your child is completing homework, ask them to explain their content to you. Having to teach content is a great strategy in learning it, ask questions and be involved.

We have seen great work thus far this year in 2019 and can't wait to see what's to come for 2020 Penola.

Uniform for 2020

Uniform is an important part of the Penola Catholic College community. It is a significant visual representation of the high standards that are promoted within our community and for the wider community. Our College uniform allows all students to feel equality as part of the College community as well as being proud to identify with the College. To that end, the College will work hard to promote compliance with the uniform standards and expects all students to adhere to the standards in order to demonstrate the mutual respect that comes from wearing the uniform well. As we progress to Penola, there are some important changes to our uniform expectations that we would like to bring to your attention.

General Uniform Rules

- Students are expected to wear the full school uniform as a requirement of attendance. The uniform is to be clean, neat and tidy at all times.
- The Winter uniform, including the College Blazer as the outside garment is mandatory during Terms 2 and 3. Scarves are to be navy blue only. Students are encouraged to wear the College jumper, spencers and/or white undershirts if they are affected by the cold in winter.
- Boys plain navy blue (Years 7 to 9) or plain grey (Years 10 to 12) socks can be purchased from the Uniform Shop. (No stripes or logos). All socks are to be at least 5cm above ankle.
- Girls white socks without stripes or logos must be at least 5 cm above the ankle and therefore foldable.
- Girls skirts should not be rolled at the waist and girls will be given 3 days allowance to adjust the hem if it is not on the knee or longer.
- Full Sports Uniform for junior students Years 7-10 only must be worn on the allocated sport day i.e. shorts and polo shirt with tracksuit jacket and pants. Otherwise full school uniform is expected. No other shirts, shorts or tracksuits or other sport items other than the official College sports uniform is be worn. Sport socks must be white, at least 5 cm above the ankle and foldable.
- The College uniform must not be mixed and matched with the sports uniform. Should a student have their sports jacket visible on a non-sport day, it will be confiscated. Similarly, students are not wear the College jumper as the outer garment on sport day. It can be worn under the College sports jacket if they are affected by the cold in winter.
- Senior students are expected to be in full school uniform every day.
- Girls may wear simple hair accessories in the colours of plain red, white or navy blue. Hair ties can also be in these colours or in the colour of their hair.
- Students representing the school are expected to wear full school uniform or they will not be permitted to
- Students who have damaged/ripped items of the uniform must fix or replace the damage with a new item.
- The uniform expectations apply to all students travelling to and from school, and in the wider community.
- All students are encouraged to wear sunscreen and may only wear the college cap in order to be Sunsafe.

School Bag

• School bags, purchased through Uniform Shop, are compulsory for ALL Students.

Hair

- Hair must be clean, neat and tidy with subtle natural colour variation, if any. Extremes of fashion are not acceptable eg, mullets, undercuts or shaved sides with a long top section (that can be put into pony tails) is an example of an extreme of fashion and is not acceptable.
- Girls hair longer than collar length must be tied back. Girls in Year 11 & 12 can wear their hair out but must have the equipment to be able to tie it back in practical subjects, such as PDHPE, TAS and Science or whenever deemed necessary by their teacher for safety.
- The hair of boys in Years 7 to 10 must sit above the collar. Boys in Years 11 & 12 may have longer hair but it must be tied back at all times when in uniform.
- Facial hair is not permitted in Years 7 to 10 as students must be clean shaven. Students in Years 11 and 12 may have facial hair if it is neatly groomed.

Tattoos

• These are not acceptable in the school. Students with a tattoo must keep it completely covered at all times under their school uniform and/or use a flesh coloured stretch tube bandage so the tattoo is not visible at any time.

Makeup (7-12)

Makeup is not to be worn to school by girls in Years 7 to 10. Year 7 to 10 girls with makeup will be asked to remove it immediately. Makeup may be worn by Year 11 or 12 girls if applied in a light and natural manner. Year 11 & 12 girls with excessive makeup will be asked to correct it to an acceptable level.

Eyelash extensions are not to be worn by any students.

Jewellery (7-12)

Ear: Two pairs of silver, gold, clear plastic stud/sleeper or hoop earrings. Only clear stones are permitted. Ear studs should be no bigger than 4mm in diameter. Ear sleepers or hoops should not exceed the diameter of a 5 cent piece. Spacers are not permitted at the College.

- Other Piercings: No other visible facial piercings are allowed during any school based activities or school day, including excursions, retreats, sport representation/activities/carnivals, mufti days etc.
- Keeping a piercing hole open will not be acceptable as an excuse. This means that clear studs are not to be worn in nose piercings as these are visible. No band-aids are to be used to cover piercings.
- One plain ring can be worn and one gold or silver bracelet may be worn.
- One gold or silver necklace may be worn and may have a a crucifix or religious symbol only.
- For safety reasons, all jewellery should be removed for sport, PDHPE or practical subjects to ensure workplace health and injury requirements are met and to reduce the risk of harm or injury.

Nail Polish (7-12)

- No acrylic nails are permitted at Penola Catholic College
- Nails should be short as excessive length may pose a safety risk or inhibit a student's ability to participate fully in the learning and are not to be worn. Therefore, nails must not exceed 3mm in length above the end of the fingertips (see photo) and the shape is to be natural, not pointed or coffin shaped. Diamantes, stick-on elements and/or sparkles are not permitted.
- Nail polish must be natural in the look (only clear or French tip nail polish are permitted) PERMITTED

Shoes

Shoes must be black, polished, hard leather, lace-up and closed-in school shoes. Students are NOT to wear soft leather casual, sport or skater shoes.





Marking of Clothes

All articles of clothing are to be clearly labelled with the student's name so any item found can be handed in to the student office and returned to the owner.

SENIOR BOYS UNIFORM (10, 11 and 12)

Summer Uniform Terms 1 and 4

- White short-sleeved shirt, open neck with College crest. The shirt may be worn out in summer. If a tie is worn, the shirt is to be tucked into the trousers.
- Grey long school trousers purchased from the Uniform Shop. A plain black belt is compulsory and must be worn.

SENIOR GIRLS UNIFORM (10, 11 & 12)

Summer Uniform Terms 1 and 4

- College senior pattern school skirt must be knee length or longer.
- College white senior short-sleeved blouse with College crest and pattern trim.

Winter Uniform Terms 2 and 3

- White short-sleeved shirt with College crest, tucked in with school tie worn with the knot at the collar.
- Grey long school trousers purchased from the Uniform Shop. A plain black belt is compulsory and must be worn.
- Optional navy blue V-neck school jumper with crest.
- The College blazer is compulsory for ALL students.

Winter Uniform Terms 2 and 3

- College senior pattern school skirt must be knee length or longer.
- College white senior short-sleeved blouse with College crest and pattern trim.
- Dark navy opaque stockings. Purchased through the Uniform Shop. (70 Denier)
- Optional navy blue V-neck school jumper with crest

JUNIOR BOYS UNIFORM (7 TO 9)

Summer Uniform Terms 1 and 4

- Blue short-sleeved shirt, open neck with College crest. The shirt may be worn out in summer.
- If a tie is worn in summer the shirt is to be tucked into the trousers.
- College Navy blue long school trousers purchased from the Uniform Shop. A plain black belt is compulsory and must be worn.
- College Navy blue dress shorts (Optional) purchased from the Uniform Shop. To be worn with regulation navy socks. Anklet socks are not allowed. (The dress shorts are optional)

JUNIOR GIRLS UNIFORM (7 TO 9)

Summer Uniform Terms 1 and 4

- College junior school skirt must be knee length or longer.
- White junior short-sleeved blouse with Peter-Pan collar and College Crest must be worn.

Winter Uniform Terms 2 and 3

- Blue short-sleeved shirt with College crest which is tucked-in
- Navy blue long school trousers purchased from the Uniform Shop. A plain black belt is compulsory and must be worn.
- No shorts to be worn in winter.
- Optional navy blue V-neck school jumper with crest.
- The school blazer is compulsory for ALL students.
- School tie must be worn with the winter uniform and for all formal occasions. Tie must be worn with the knot at the collar.

Winter Uniform Terms 2 and 3

- College junior school skirt must be knee length or longer.
- White junior blouse with Peter-Pan collar and College Crest must be worn.
- Dark navy opaque stockings. Purchased through the Uniform Shop. (Denier 70).
- Navy blue V-neck school jumper with crest.
 (Optional)
- The school blazer is compulsory for ALL students.

Sport Uniform Boys and Girls Years 7 to 10 to be worn on Thursdays only

- College polo shirt with College crest
- College tracksuit jacket & pants must both be purchased.
- Shoes must be lace-up sport shoe style not canvas.
- College navy blue shorts, with crest.
- Plain white ankle length sport socks that are 5cm above the ankle without logos/ branding

Note:

If students have a practical subject such as woodwork or science, they must bring their black leather shoes to wear to satisfy work health and safety requirements.

Furthermore, as the school transitions to the Penola Catholic College uniform, the McCarthy Catholic College uniform will still be permissible. In 2021 the new uniform will be available for Years 7 and Year 10 as well as any other students in the College who wishes to purchase the new uniform at that time. Over the following years, the Penola uniform will then become the uniform of the College. Uniform items can be purchased from the College Uniform Shop on School grounds which is open on **Tuesday afternoons, from midday till 4pm and on Thursday mornings from 8am till midday.**

IF A STUDENT IS UNABLE TO WEAR THE CORRECT UNIFORM he/she must bring a note in to school, written in the diary, signed by a parent or guardian explaining the situation and giving an indication of when it will be rectified as a matter of priority. The note must be shown to the Stage Leader of Learning who will sign it as an indication this has been noted. This note option is to be used in extreme situations and students will only have limited opportunities to supply a note before detentions will be issued, eg lunchtime detention.

If students do not meet our uniform standards there will be consequences issued. Penola Catholic College reserves the right to enforce these uniform guidelines and will make every effort to do so fairly, consistently and equitably.

The process at the school is as follow.

- Students who do not meet our high standards of uniform will be given a lunch detention.
- Should they receive three uniform detentions in a term, they will be given an afternoon detention.
- Should the student still choose to break the uniform rules, he/she will be removed from class until a meeting with a parent or guardian can be arranged. At this meeting, the College standards will be further explained and compliance agreed.
- Should the child continue to choose to break the uniform rules, he or she may be externally suspended and a meeting with the Principal to review the student's plan for meeting College expectations will be required before returning to the College.

PLEASE NOTE:

Should a parent wish to have a period of variation from the College Uniform rules, these are only possible at the Principal's discretion and applications will need to be made to the Principal's Secretary to arrange and meeting for the proposal to be discussed. Any appeal for variation should be made as a sign of courtesy and good will PRIOR to a student and family wishing to make a decision that is not in keeping with the College's uniform expectations.
