Winter Uniform

Students return to school for Term 2 on Tuesday 26 April, after the ANZAC Day Public Holiday. The changeover from summer to winter uniform for Term 2 is always difficult to determine with our changing weather patterns. However, we have decided that Week 1 and 2 being the changeover period when students can choose to wear winter or summer uniforms — not a mixture of them — depending on the weather, with the beginning of **Week 3 Monday 9 May** being the time all students should be in their full Winter Uniform.

Friendship

At our last assembly, I spoke about friendship. There is no greater lesson to be learnt than to be treated as you treat others. I continue to implore students to think about how they treat others. Be the friend you wish to have. As the year progresses and issues arise, this will be the first question I ask of students. Are you being the friend you wish to have? and importantly, are you being kind?

Open Night

Thank you to the Year 7 and 8 students that assisted on the Open Evening. The hospitality and respect you showed to visitors and others in our community was uplifting. Thank you to all the students and staff for instilling in our visitors a sense of community and belonging.

NAPLAN

Parents/Carers will receive information regarding NAPLAN Tests for Year 7 via the COMPASS portal early in Term 2. The College will ensure students are familiar with the format of the tests before the NAPLAN test window. It is important to remember that NAPLAN is not about passing or failing, but about assessing learning progress. The best approach for preparing your child for NAPLAN is to encourage your child to do the best they can on the day.

Attendance

Attendance matters and we need your help this year. Only two absences every month can add up to four weeks of lost learning over the year. Missing school, whether for justified or unjustified reasons, disrupts a student's education. Having one day off a fortnight equates to your son/daughter missing out on 4 weeks of school in a year. You play a big role in ensuring that your child is an everyday learner who attends school every day.

20 minutes a day	100 minutes of learning (2 whole periods)	80 periods (nearly 2 and a ½ weeks of school)	15 weeks of school (one and a ½ terms)
½ an hour a day	150 minutes of learning (3 periods or HALF A DAY OF LEARNING)	120 periods (4 weeks of school)	24 weeks of school (more than half a year)
1 hour a day	300 minutes of learning (6 periods or ONE WHOLE DAY OF LEARNING)	240 periods (8 weeks of school almost a full term!)	48 weeks of school (over one year of school missed)

The tables suggest that missing school can equate to more time off school then considered when you allow your child to take the day off. These statistics show exactly what we don't want for the students here, as we want them to experience the best learning, they can here at Penola Catholic College. Please acknowledge that your child should not be taking time off school for unjustified reasons, as it can take a major toll on their education. Attendance does matter, and we are seeking your help.

College Uniform

Our college community takes great pride in wearing our college uniform and as a result, we have specific expectations and guidelines around uniform attire for our students. Our Penola uniform is most significant as it identifies and unites us as a community while also meeting the WHS requirements. We ask families to support the college with our uniform policy and ensure students are dressed appropriately in the correct school uniform. Please spend time with your child to read through pages 18-23 of the College Diary to better understand the college uniform requirements. Some items to note:

- Long hair must be tied back
- Extreme haircuts are not permitted. These include mullets, undercuts, scalp designs etc.
- Hair must be one natural colour
- No visible body piercings are permitted. These include facial, nose and tongue piercings. One small set of silver or gold round, stud earrings in the lower earlobe only.
- One simple/discrete gold or silver chain around the neck with an appropriate religious symbol may be worn. Please read page 19 of the College Diary to better understand the jewellery expectations.
- Sports Jackets cannot be worn with the summer or winter college uniform. Students must wear the jumper or blazer with their summer uniform or winter uniform if they are cool.

- For safety reasons, shoes must be black, polished, hard leather, laced up and closed-in school shoes. This is a WHS requirement. Soft leather, casual, sports or skater shoes are not permitted with their everyday College uniform.
- Athletic style running shoes are the only sports shoes that can be worn with the college PE uniform. Canvas style casual running shoes are not to be worn for safety reasons for PE or Sport.
- Penola uniform socks (grey/blue stripe) can be purchased only through LOWES.
